Our Riverside HQ - Project Update

At last we have news of positive progress since the rather depressing report in the Summer issue. After 11 months of waiting, we finally had the green light from the Environment Agency for both Planning and Flood Risk Assessment. Hurrah! This, together with the SODC Planning permission received a while ago, has enabled the project to move to the next stage - Procurement.

The tender documents for project construction were published at the end of August with a bidding close date of 22nd September. Bids are now being evaluated prior to contractor selection. The question now is "Who is the contractor and when will construction commence?" and that may not be until early in 2024, depending upon the river conditions and the contractor's view of working through the winter. We will have to see.

I think it is sensible to assume we will at least start the new season at Benson operating as now but perhaps hope to move to our 'new home' in May/June 2024. What a day that will be! Fingers crossed!

A Record-Breaking Season

WOW-one smashes last season's records! Passenger numbers hit the 252 mark for the season

What an incredible year we have had! As at the end of the season our amazing volunteers have successfully made 65 trips in our wheelyboat WOW-one taking out 252 passengers, all disabled and less mobile people together with their friends and families. At the start of the season we set ourselves a 'stretch' target of 200 passengers to be carried by the end of September and, thanks to all the efforts of so many of our wonderful volunteers, we have smashed that. Amazing!

This is our third year of operation and the number of passengers taking the opportunity of getting out on the river in WOW-one has grown year-on-year which is so pleasing. The good news story of what we can offer is getting around — may it continue to do so!!

Monster fish seen at Benson

"A giant leap, silver flanks – perhaps a salmon?"

Our Roving Reporter investigated the alleged sighting of a large fish leaping in the stretch of our river immediately upstream of Benson Weir. The suggestion was it was a salmon (Salmo salar, The Leaper)! If true, this would be amazing!



The Thames was a prolific salmon river several centuries ago but this amazing fish effectively disappeared as the river's pollution increased with the advent of the Industrial Revolution. Despite the river's water quality improving significantly in the last 50 years, salmon have failed to return even though a reintroduction programme was attempted in the 1970's. The presence of a large salmon now would surely be a remarkable 'one-off'.

Notwithstanding the chances of locating this most sought-after of fighting fish, our intrepid salmon angler, JJ, accompanied by our world salmon fly-casting championship contender, Ally, took to WOW-one in an attempt to entice the fish with a deadly artificial fly. They recognised their chances of hooking up were very, very slim but nevertheless it was a chance that was not to be missed!

We were lucky that our Roving Reporter managed to take the photograph above which captured the essence of the hunt – the concentration of JJ casting the line and Ally in support, ever-alert with large landing net in hand, is manifest!

Passing under Shillingford Bridge was a noisy affair, calling out and listening for our echo. We waved at passing boaters and read the names of moored boats. Who knew there would be so much to do on such a tranquil stretch of river!

Passing under Pooh Sticks Bridge, we came to Days Lock where the boat was expertly turned around, ready to head home. The 2hr trip provided plenty of time to reminisce. Stories were shared with much laughter as new memories were made.

Every one of our residents have had a positive experience aboard WOW-one. Now, when I ask them about their trip, I hear a resounding "When can we go again?"
